Report on New Story Retreat

The weekend of June 10-12, Mary Coelho, Jane Cutting, Dave and Inge Damm-Luhr, Judith Morse, and Cornelia Parkes joined Gwen Noyes and Art Klipfel at their home in West Falmouth to celebrate the reinstatement of the New Story yearly retreats. Before the retreat we submitted topics that we would like to discuss. These formed the basis of our agenda for the weekend. We had ten-minute plus check-ins on topics that rose up for us, which left us feeling well heard. Some topics and reflections:

- Decolonizing Wealth: Indigenous wisdom to heal divides and restore balance by Edgar Villanueva. "
- A <u>course</u> offered by <u>Earth Literacies</u> on 'What's Love Got to Do With It' taught by Richard Watson
- The relational theory of quantum physics in *Helgoland: Making Sense of the Quantum Revolution* by Carlo Rovelli.
- Purpose
- The Job One website
- What to do at the next New Story meeting? We decided to bring extended check-ins to the next New Story group meeting
- What to do with the material from the Cosmic Walk Labyrinth? We will try to find a home for it at Cambridge Friends School.
- Like everyone else I fluctuate between hope and despair but find it helpful to focus on concrete tasks that raise awareness of the climate crisis and hopefully reduce its impact. To work in a group with other women has been comforting and uplifting, as has been sharing our concerns and ideas during this retreat.
- Let's make sure in our work together to highlight what's happening in each of us and in the wider world that shows and supports moving toward living the new story of interdependence, and away from the old story of domination and exploitation.

During the weekend we put post it notes on the wall answering two topics and in closing we grouped the comments into categories. This was another way to capture our thoughts during the process.

- 1. Shifts in me that show movement toward living the New Story
 - I'm opening to the natural world in whatever ways I can.
 - o I'm opening more and more to learning from Indigenous wisdom and its lessons.
 - o Healing of the individual is not separate from healing of the earth
 - Cultivating our interiors to live the New Story
- 2. Shifts in the world that show movement toward living the New Story
 - So many resources and information available
 - Together we can do what needs to be done
 - How can grow out of our social comfort zone and fully participate in a more diverse realm?
 - I'm seeing/hearing possible "new stories" all over the place.

This and much more made for a rich and full weekend.
