We will continue the discussion from our November meeting on "What is Ecotheology?" and watch Part Two of Philip Clayton's video "Ecotheology: or Why Climate Crisis and Eco-Anxiety Require a Radically Different Kind of Theology" available here. Part One asks whether ecotheology is consistent with the central beliefs of the Catholic Christian tradition. Part Two (27:10 to 50:08) is the construction of an ecotheology on its own terms. In the introduction, Clayton says, "I want to propose a theology that fully incorporates ecology in the very heart of its methods and conclusions. This is an approach to theology that genuinely can bring hope. Christian theology and ecology can be fully fused in ecotheology. Ecotheology does not need to be Christian."

At the FMC New Story Group meeting on Monday, November 28, Cornelia Parkes led a discussion on the query, "What is Ecotheology?" Her short answer is that ecotheology is the theology needed to bring the sacredness of nature into the Christian theology of theism. In *God and Gravity: a Philip Clayton Reader on Science and Theology*, Clayton explores the role of panentheism as the integrator. Karen Armstrong's *Sacred Nature: Restoring our ancient bond with the natural world* shows how other religions have already integrated the sacredness of nature in their worldview. We had a lively discussion. The slides are available on the New Story webpage and as a <u>pdf download here</u>.

Otto Scharmer "Protecting the Flame: Circles of Radical Presence in Times of Collapse" September 6, 2022, 16 minute read here. Scharmer writes:

- The first theme is that we are living in a time of accelerated breakdown and collapse.
- The second theme is the sinking feeling that arises when taking all of this in.
- The third theme is about the massive knowing-doing gap that has been embodied in our collective behavior over the past 50+ years.

Before I go more into detail on how to transform the knowing-doing gap — including a discussion of the key findings of the Earth for All study — let's contemplate the deeper significance of these three themes.

Goatwalking: A guide to wildland living, a quest for the peaceable kingdom by Jim Corbett
