

"What the book proposed was that "secularization" wasn't a useful label for the American religious transformation. Instead, I wrote, American culture seems "as God-besotted today as ever" — still fascinated with the figure of Jesus of Nazareth, still in search of divine favor and transcendence. But these interests and obsessions are much less likely to be channeled through churches, Protestant and Catholic, that maintain some connection to historical Christian orthodoxies. Instead, our longtime national impulse toward heresy — toward personalized revisions of Christian doctrine, Americanized updates of the gospel — has finally completed its victory over older Christian institutions and traditions.

...This America has a church of self-love, with prophets like Oprah Winfrey preaching a gospel of the divine self, a "God Within" spirituality that risks making selfishness a virtue. It has a church of prosperity, with figures like Joel Osteen as its bishops, that insists that God desires nothing more for his elect than

American prosperity, capitalist success. And it has churches of politics, preaching redemption through political activism — a Christian nationalism on the right, by turns messianic and apocalyptic, and a progressive utopianism on the left, convinced that history's arc bends always in its favor.

...While wokeness is a variation on the Protestant social gospel, it's clearly the most-de-Christianized form yet; it's happy to find allies within the Christian churches, but its own spiritual projects are more likely to involve the elevation of indigenous, pre-Christian spiritualities.
