Topic for October: "Community" with Dave Damm-Luhr

We've said that "living the New Story" means *moving from systems of oppression*, *endless extraction*, *and domination to generative and reciprocal relations with each other and all forms of life*. The sessions since the first of the year have offered a rich array of possibilities for doing that, with the theme of *community* increasingly visible. The next two sessions offer a chance to solicit and hear everyone's thoughts about community as both context of and pathway toward living the New Story. This evening we'll collect initial ideas for actions to live the New Story, cocreate a shared framework for strengthening our community. With the framework in hand, we can set an intention to build next month on those initial action ideas to experience and live the New Story more fully individually and as a community.

Ahead of our meeting, please reflect on your personal experience in other communities and come ready to name one way a community you value has met your (and others') needs.

Editorial

Rereading Cosmogenesis

I seldom reread books. Helgoland: Making Sense of the Quantum Revolution by Carlo Rovelli is one I have reread several times. I absorb a little more each time. Cosmogenesis by Brian Swimme is another. I am rereading it because I raced through it the first time just feeling the joy and excitement of his discoveries. I am feeling even more moved by his story the second time. I am sinking deeper into the nugget of truth that he is trying to express. There is one sentence in the Prolog that I have been meditating on for several weeks: "If I wanted to tell the story of the expanding universe and how it developed through time, I needed to include the story of my long struggle out of the structures of existence I had been born into." That speaks to my experience. I wonder if it is universal.

Mary's most recent paper "Trauma to Transcendence" speaks directly to how she has dealt with her childhood trauma. "This essay is a deeply personal story about seeking to respond to a strong spiritual invitation and becoming conscious of the hidden reasons that prevented the author from responding fully, particularly a family tragedy that had an enormous spiritual cost. The essay describes the importance of the great breakthroughs in worldview brought by the new cosmology and the radical discoveries in physics. Coelho describes their importance for human self-understanding and as a foundation for entering the fullness of our being. Given the depth of our belonging revealed by the New Story, we dare to become aware of the consequences of trauma that may be buried in our consciousness, according to Coelho." Mary's essay is powerful. Know yourself. Trauma and fear break the links that form community.

As for what community means to me, I like the image of Indira's net. Each of us is a node in the net and the collection of links is the community. Put this image together with Swimme's insight into the omnicentricity of the universe, and each node becomes an image of the whole. Combine this with a new understanding of "God," and the phrase "There is that of God in everyone" acquires a deeper significance than most Quakers realize.
