Topic: "**Changing Systems of Power from the Inside**" with Alicia McBride (she/her), Senior Director for Quaker Leadership, Friends Committee on National Legislation (FCNL). We seek a world free of war and the threat of war. We seek a society with equity and justice for all. We seek a community where every person's potential may be fulfilled. We seek an earth restored. Advancing this vision, which drives the Friends Committee on National Legislation's work, requires challenging the assumptions and accepted truths of the very systems of governmental power that FCNL operates within. How can we both use these systems and work to transform them? How do we stay grounded in our spiritual center and our own values in an environment operating from different rules? In this session, we'll explore the many aspects of working to shift paradigms and influence policy from within the very systems we endeavor to change.
